Other

- 1. Pursuant to rule 76 of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence and the orders of the Trial Chamber IX,¹ the Prosecution submits its list of evidence, list of witnesses, and summaries of the anticipated testimony of Prosecution witnesses, appended as annexes A, B and C respectively.
- 2. The list of evidence features the titles and evidence registration numbers of the items of evidence on which the Prosecution intends to rely. It also lists witness testimony obtained pursuant to article 56 of the Rome Statute that has already been recognised as formally submitted² by Trial Chamber IX.
- 3. The list of witnesses sets out each witness's name, designated witness number, gender, modality of presentation,³ provisional order of appearance, estimated length of direct examination and whether the witness is also a participating victim.⁴ The list features 120 witnesses on whose evidence the Prosecution relies to prove its charges: 69 witnesses who will provide live testimony, 44 witnesses regarding whom the Prosecution has sought⁵ or will shortly seek admission of prior recorded testimony into evidence pursuant to rule 68(2),⁶ and 7 witnesses whose testimony has already been formally submitted.⁷
- 4. The summaries of anticipated testimony relate to the 69 witnesses who will provide live testimony.
