Other

- 1. On 27 September 2016, the Trial Chamber VIII found Mr. Al Mahdi guilty of the war crime of attacking protected objects under Article 8(2)(e)(iv) of the Rome Statute in its 'Judgement and Sentence' decision.¹
- 2. On 29 September 2016, the Trial Chamber VIII issued its 'Reparation Phase Calendar' and invited interested organizations to request leave to make submission by 21 October 2016, in accordance with Rule 103 of the Court's Rules of Procedure and Evidence.²
- 3. On 21 October 2016, UNESCO requested the Trial Chamber VIII to concede an exceptional one-week time extension to submit its request. On the same date, the Single Judge granted UNESCO's request, inviting the Organization to request leave to make submission by 28 October 2016 at 4 pm.³
- 4. It is submitted that UNESCO has extensive knowledge and expertise in the field of historical and religious heritage, including in the city of Timbuktu, where the event took place. In particular, UNESCO's submission would address the importance of international cultural heritage generally and the harm to the international community caused by its destruction.
- 5. Accordingly, UNESCO respectfully requests the Trial Chamber VIII to authorize the Organization to submit observations pursuant to Article 75(3) of the Rome Statute and Rule 103 of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence.
