- 1. Pursuant to rule 103 of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence, and in response to the Appeals Chamber's order ICC-02/05-01/09 OA2 inviting expressions of interest, the Government of the United Mexican States ("Mexico") hereby applies for leave to submit written observations as *amicus curiae* in the appeal of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan -of 12 December 2017 (ICC-02/05-01/09-326)- against the decision of the Pre-Trial Chamber II entitled 'Decision under article 87(7) of the Rome Statute on the non-compliance by Jordan with the request by the Court for the arrest and surrender [of] Omar Al-Bashir' of 11 December 2017 (ICC-02/05-01/09-309).
- 2. If leave to submit written observations is granted, Mexico will file its *amicus curiae* brief within the time-limit to be fixed by the Appeals Chamber, and would submit any further comments as requested.

Mexico's interest in this proceeding

- 3. Mexico is a State Party to the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court since 1 January 2006.
- 4. Mexico has ratified several international instruments whereby it recognizes the privileges and immunities of Heads of State *ratione personae*. Furthermore, Mexico has a long standing bilateral tradition of demanding and recognizing the immunity of Heads of States for alleged acts performed within their official capacity.
- 5. Mexico has been and continues to be a supporter of the strengthening of the international criminal justice system, and acknowledges the importance of States' cooperation in order to prevent the commission of atrocities and to end impunity.
- 6. Mexico believes that the issues raised within this proceeding are to the Court's effectiveness, and that the decision to be reached by the Chamber will have a significant impact on the cooperation between States Parties and the Court.

- 7. Mexico is interested in participating in this judicial proceeding to ensure that the points of view of all legal systems and regions are taken into consideration.
- 8. The Government of Mexico welcomes order ICC-02/05-01/09 OA2 inviting expressions of interest and believes its submission as *amicus curiae* will assist the Appeals Chamber in its endeavour.

Issues on which Mexico requests to submit observations as amicus curiae

9. If leave to submit written observations as *amicus curiae* is granted, Mexico proposes to deal with the following subject matters:

A. The Rome Statute vis-à-vis customary international law

- I. Whether the application of article 98(1) excludes the application of article 27(2) of the Rome Statute.
- II. Whether the Rome Statute may create obligations or deprive rights of States not Parties to it.
- III. Whether treaty obligations (obligations to cooperate) prevail over customary obligations (sovereign immunities).
- IV. Whether articles 89(1) and 98 of the Rome Statute establish a special consultation procedure with State Parties.

B. The Rome Statute vis- \hat{a} -vis other treaties

I. Whether the obligations contained in the Rome Statute prevail *vis-à-vis* other international law treaties.

C. Legal consequences of the referrals of the UN Security Council

- I. Whether the United Nations Security Council –through a referral of a situation to the ICC- may bind a State not Party to the Rome Statue.
- II. Whether the United Nations Security Council can overturn an international customary norm.

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10. For these reasons, Mexico respectfully requests the Chamber to grant it leave to submit written observations as *amicus curiae* on the matters stated above.
