The Appeals Chamber of the International Criminal Court,

In the appeal of Mr Jean-Pierre Bemba Gombo against the decision of Trial Chamber III entitled “Judgment pursuant to Article 74 of the Statute” of 21 March 2016 (ICC-01/05-01/08-3343),

*Renders* unanimously the following

## DECISION

- (1) The victims who participated in the trial proceedings in the case of *The Prosecutor v. Jean-Pierre Bemba Gombo* may, through their legal representative, participate in the present appeal proceedings for the purpose of presenting their views and concerns in respect of their personal interests in the issues on appeal.
- (2) The legal representative of victims may file observations within 30 days of the notification of the response to the document in support of the appeal and these observations may be no longer than 60 pages.
- (3) Mr Jean-Pierre Bemba Gombo and the Prosecutor may each file a response to the victims’ observations filed in accordance with the preceding paragraph. These responses must be filed within 30 days of the notification of the victims’ observations and may be no longer than 60 pages each.

## REASONS

1. The purpose of the present decision is to regulate the participation of victims in the appeal brought by Mr Jean-Pierre Bemba Gombo<sup>1</sup> (“Mr Bemba”) against Trial Chamber III’s “Judgment pursuant to Article 74 of the Statute”<sup>2</sup> of 21 March 2016 (“Conviction Decision”).
2. Under article 68 (3) of the Statute, “[w]here the personal interests of the victims are affected, the Court shall permit their views and concerns to be presented and

considered at stages of the proceedings determined to be appropriate by the Court and in a manner which is not prejudicial to or inconsistent with the rights of the accused and a fair and impartial trial”.

3. The Appeals Chamber notes that Trial Chamber III issued eleven decisions on victim participation, authorising 5,229 victims to participate in the trial proceedings in the case of *The Prosecutor v. Jean-Pierre Bemba Gombo*.<sup>3</sup> Pursuant to regulation 86 (8) of the Regulations of the Court, “[a] decision taken by a Chamber under rule 89 shall apply throughout the proceedings in the same case, subject to the powers of the relevant Chamber in accordance with rule 91, sub-rule 1”. The Appeals Chamber notes that Mr Bemba was convicted on all charges brought against him<sup>4</sup> and that his appeal against the Conviction Decision is directed against the entirety of the decision.<sup>5</sup> Therefore, the Appeals Chamber finds that the victims who participated in the trial proceedings may participate in the appeal proceedings against the Conviction Decision, as, in principle, their personal interests are affected by the appeal in the same way as during trial.<sup>6</sup>

4. Pursuant to rule 91 (1) of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence (“Rules”), and having regard to rules 91 (2), 92 (5) and (6) of the Rules, the Appeals Chamber determines that the victims may participate in the present appeals in the following manner: the legal representative of victims may file observations presenting the victims’ views and concerns with respect to the issues on appeal insofar as their personal interests are affected within 30 days of the notification of the response to the document in support of the appeal. Mr Bemba and the Prosecutor may each file a response to the victims’ observations within 30 days of the notification thereof. Should the need arise to specify the modalities of victims’ participation in the pending appeal further, the Appeals Chamber will give supplementary directions, either upon its own motion or upon application by the legal representative of victims.
