- 10 THE COURT USHER: [9:31:30] All rise.
- 11 The International Criminal Court is now in session.
- 12 Please be seated.
- 13 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:31:58] Good morning, everyone.
- 14 Madam Court Officer, can you kindly mention the case.
- 15 THE COURT OFFICER: [9:32:05] Good morning, Madam President. Good
- 16 morning, your Honours.
- 17 This is the situation in the Central African Republic II, in the case of the Prosecutor
- versus Mahamat Said Abdel Kani, case reference ICC-01/14-01/21.
- 19 And for the record, we're in open session.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:32:22] Thank you very much.
- 21 Can I have the parties introduce themselves.
- 22 Ms Makwaia for the Prosecution.
- 23 MS MAKWAIA: [9:32:30] Thank you, Madam President, your Honours. Good
- 24 morning. For the Prosecution this morning, myself Holo Makwaia, senior trial
- 25 lawyer; Ms Sanyu Ndagire, associate legal assistant; Ms Alessia Vitiello, analysis

- 1 assistant; and Mr Kamran Choudhry, trial lawyer. Thank you.
- 2 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:32:47] Thank you very much, Ms Makwaia.
- 3 Ms Pellet for the victims, please.
- 4 MS PELLET: [9:32:54](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President. The victims
- 5 are represented by Tars Van Litsenborgh and by myself, Sarah Pellet, counsel with
- 6 the Office of Public Counsel for Victims.
- 7 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:33:07] Thank you very much, Ms Pellet.
- 8 Ms Naouri for the Defence, please.
- 9 MS NAOURI: [9:33:15](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President. Good
- morning. By my side we have Maître Jacobs; by his side, Fiana Gantheret; behind,
- 11 we have Léa Allix; and I am Jennifer Naouri, lead counsel for Mr Said.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:33:28] Thank you very much, Ms Naouri.
- 13 And for the record, I take note that Mr Said is in court.
- 14 A very good morning to you, Mr Said, I hope you had a restful weekend.
- 15 MR SAID: [9:33:49](Interpretation) Yes. Good morning, Madam President.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:33:52] Thank you.
- We note that the Prosecution is calling P-2263 as its 23rd witness.
- 18 The Chamber previously rejected an application by the Prosecution to introduce
- 19 P-2263's prior recorded testimony pursuant to Rule 68(2)(b) of the Rules in decision
- 20 number 556, but we granted authorisation pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules.
- 21 The Chamber has been informed that this witness will be either testifying in French or
- 22 Sango, so I remind everyone of the importance of the need to speak slowly and to
- 23 observe the five-second rule between questions and answers.
- 24 The Chamber notes that the Prosecution has submitted a request to introduce
- 25 the annex to P-2263's witness preparation log pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules of

- 1 Procedure and Evidence.
- 2 So I'll now rule on the Prosecution's request to introduce the prior recorded testimony
- 3 of this witness as contained in the annex to his witness preparation log. And, for
- 4 the record, this request is filing number 693.
- 5 The annex contains some corrections and clarifications to P-2263's prior recorded
- 6 testimony, whose introduction via Rule 68(3) the Chamber already granted. And,
- 7 for the record, the decision is filing number 556.
- 8 The Prosecution submits that the annex contains additional information that was not
- 9 included in P-2263's original prior recorded testimony. According to the Prosecution,
- 10 the new information bears sufficient indicia of reliability, is relevant and probative
- and its introduction would expedite the proceedings.
- 12 In its response to the Prosecution's request, the Defence submits that it should be
- 13 rejected and it reiterates its general objections to the introduction of annexes to
- 14 witnesses' preparation logs. The Defence notes in particular that there is no means
- of verifying whether the information provided in the log came from the witness or
- 16 was suggested to him by the investigators.
- 17 The Chamber recalls that its oral decision of 2 November 2022 only requires
- 18 the parties to make a request pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules if the annex to
- 19 the witness preparation log contains additional information that was not included in
- 20 the prior recorded testimony previously ruled on by the Chamber or when certain
- 21 corrections or clarifications change the substance of the testimony. When
- 22 the witness only makes minor corrections or clarifications to his or her prior recorded
- 23 testimony during the witness preparation session, there is no need to make a request
- 24 pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules.
- 25 Moreover, not every bit of new information that is provided during a witness

- 1 preparation session necessitates a Rule 68(3) request. This is only required when
- 2 the new information changes the substance of the prior recorded testimony.
- 3 In respect of P-2263's comment regarding paragraph 20 of his second statement,
- 4 the Chamber recognises that the information provided therein is not new.
- 5 Nevertheless, since the information potentially relates to the acts and conduct of
- 6 a said commander of the OCRB, the Chamber will not permit the introduction of that
- 7 part of the annex under Rule 68(3) of the Rules and instead instructs the Prosecution
- 8 to examine the witness in court in relation to these matters.
- 9 The Chamber finds that the other information contained in the annex to P-2263's
- 10 witness preparation log does not contain any information which changes
- 11 the substance of his prior recorded testimony. Accordingly, there was no need for
- 12 the Prosecution to make a request pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules in relation to
- those parts of the annex. The Prosecution merely needs to confirm with the witness
- 14 that he made such corrections and clarifications and seek its introduction as part of
- 15 the original prior recorded testimony.
- 16 Now, this concludes the Chamber's oral decision.
- 17 The Chamber also notes that the Common Legal Representative of the Victims made
- a request to examine P-2263 for 30 minutes in relation to the following topics,
- 19 the harm he allegedly suffered as a result of the events falling within the scope of
- 20 the witness's expected testimony and reparations. The parties did not object to
- 21 the Common Legal Representative's request. The Chamber agrees that the proposed
- 22 topics relates to P-2263's interest and accordingly authorises the Common Legal
- 23 Representative to question the witness for no more than 30 minutes.
- Now, before commencing, the Chamber notes briefly that protective measures are
- 25 confirmed for this witness by virtue of decision number 605 and that the VWU

- 1 recommends certain special measures.
- 2 Madam Court Officer, can you kindly connect us to the witness.
- 3 (The witness enters the video-link room)
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:41:19] Are we connected?
- 5 Thank you very much.
- 6 Good morning, Mr Witness. Can you see me? Can you hear me?
- 7 WITNESS: CAR-OTP-P-2263
- 8 (The witness speaks Sango)
- 9 (The witness gives evidence via video link)
- 10 THE WITNESS: [9:41:38](Interpretation) Good morning. I can see you and I can
- 11 hear you.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:41:44] Thank you very much.
- Now, Mr Witness, you are going to testify before the International Criminal Court.
- 14 So, on behalf of the Chamber, I would like to welcome you to this courtroom.
- 15 You should have before you the solemn declaration --
- 16 THE WITNESS: [9:42:09](No interpretation)
- 17 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:42:12] You should have before you the solemn
- declaration that any witness who appears before this Court must agree to.
- 19 I am going to read it out to you now, Mr Witness.
- 20 THE WITNESS: [9:42:38](Interpretation) Thank you.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:42:48] I solemnly declare that I will speak the truth,
- 22 the whole truth and nothing but the truth.
- Now, Mr Witness, do you understand and agree to what I have just read out to you?
- 24 THE WITNESS: [9:43:20](Interpretation) Yes, I have understood.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:43:24] Good. We will continue.

- 1 Mr Witness, let me now explain to you the protective measures that the Chamber has
- 2 put in place for your testimony.
- 3 We have in place for you voice and face distortion for the duration of your testimony.
- 4 This means that no one outside the courtroom can see your face or hear your real
- 5 voice during your testimony.
- 6 We also have -- we also have in place for you, Mr Witness, the use of pseudonym. In
- 7 accordance with that, we shall all only refer to you as "Mr Witness", to make sure that
- 8 the public does not know your name.
- 9 When you answer questions that will not give away who you are, we will do so in
- 10 open session. Now, that means that the public can hear what is being said in this
- 11 courtroom.
- 12 When you are asked to describe anything that relates specifically to you, or you are
- asked to mention facts that might reveal your identity, we will do this in private
- 14 session.
- 15 Do you understand all that I have said in respect of your protective measures,
- 16 Mr Witness?
- 17 THE WITNESS: [9:46:02](Interpretation) Yes, I have understood.
- 18 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:46:04] So, lastly, I have a few practical matters you
- 19 should have in mind when giving your testimony.
- 20 Everything we say here in this courtroom is written down and interpreted. It is
- 21 therefore important to speak clearly and at a slow pace. Please speak into
- 22 the microphone and only start speaking when the person asking you the question has
- 23 finished.
- 24 To allow for the interpretation, everyone has to wait a few seconds before starting to

25 speak.

- 1 Do you understand, Mr Witness?
- 2 THE WITNESS: [9:47:11](Interpretation) Yes, it is clear.
- 3 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:47:13] Good.
- 4 If you yourself have any questions or if you need a break, raise your hand so that we
- 5 know here that you want to say something to us.
- 6 Furthermore, we hope that there are no issues with the video link. However, if there
- 7 are any issues with the technology, be rest assured that we will do our best to have
- 8 things sorted out as quickly as possible.
- 9 Have you understood all that I have said, Mr Witness?
- 10 THE WITNESS: [9:48:06](Interpretation) Yes, I have understood.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:48:08] Thank you very much.
- 12 So we are going to start with your testimony. The Prosecution will put questions to
- 13 you and we will wait for your answer.
- 14 Thank you, Madam Prosecutor. Your witness, please.
- 15 QUESTIONED BY MS NDAGIRE:
- 16 Q. [9:48:35] Good morning, Mr Witness. My name is Sanyu Ndagire. I'm an
- 17 assistant associate legal officer with the Prosecution team. We met recently, last
- 18 week, and before that some weeks ago. I will be asking you a few questions on
- 19 behalf of the Prosecution.
- 20 And, Madam President, I request if we go into private session for a few seconds for
- 21 the witness to provide his name, please.
- 22 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:49:05] Thank you very much.
- 23 Madam Court Officer, can we go into private session briefly, please.
- 24 (Private session at 9.49 a.m.)
- 25 THE COURT OFFICER: [9:49:23] We're in private session, Madam President.

- 1 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:49:26] Thank you.
- 2 Ms Ndagire, please, your witness.
- 3 MS NDAGIRE: [9:49:34]
- 4 Q. [9:49:35] Mr Witness, we are now in private session and you may speak freely
- 5 and provide us your names, please. Could you please tell the Court your full name.
- 6 A. [9:49:57] Yes, I can give my full name.
- 7 Q. [9:50:02] Mr Witness, please, please tell the Court your full names. We are in
- 8 private session so you have nothing to fear. People outside cannot hear you.
- 9 A. [9:50:30] My name is (Redacted).
- 10 Q. [9:50:39] Thank you for that.
- 11 And what is your current occupation?
- 12 A. [9:51:01] I am a (Redacted).
- 13 Q. [9:51:13] And where did you live in 2013, Mr Witness?
- 14 A. [9:51:33] In the year 2013, I was living in (Redacted).
- 15 Q. [9:51:50] And just so we know, in which country is (Redacted)
- 16 (Redacted)?
- 17 A. [9:52:13] (Redacted)
- 18 (Redacted).
- 19 Q. [9:52:39] Thank you very much.
- 20 Madam President, we can now go back to open session.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:52:46] Madam Court Officer, can we go back into
- 22 open session, please. Thank you.
- 23 (Open session at 9.53 a.m.)
- 24 THE COURT OFFICER: [9:53:03] We're back in open session, Madam President.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:53:06] Thank you very much.

- 1 Madam Prosecutor, continue, please.
- 2 MS NDAGIRE: [9:53:10]
- 3 Q. [9:53:12] Mr Witness, we are now in open session. So please be careful not to
- 4 reveal your full names. And if at all you need to mention your name and you would
- 5 like us to go into private session, please feel free to inform the Court that.
- 6 I will now ask you a few questions based on two topics. The first is your statements
- 7 and then the second will be additional questions about a specific topic in your
- 8 statement.
- 9 Mr Witness, do you recall being interviewed by investigators from the Office of the
- 10 Prosecutor?
- 11 A. [9:54:25] Yes, I do remember.
- 12 Q. [9:54:32] Do you remember which year it was?
- 13 A. [9:54:50] I no longer recall the year.
- 14 Q. [9:54:56] That's fine. And on that occasion was a statement -- were you
- interviewed by the investigators from the Office of the Prosecutor?
- 16 A. [9:55:21] That is correct, yes.
- 17 Q. [9:55:27] And after that process, was a statement taken down by
- the investigators of the Office of the Prosecutor?
- 19 A. [9:55:53] Yes, my statement was taken down.
- 20 Q. [9:55:59] And after that, was your statement read back to you by
- 21 the investigators?
- 22 A. [9:56:20] Yes, my statement was read back to me.
- 23 Q. [9:56:27] And were you able to sign that statement after it was read back to you?
- 24 A. [9:56:43] Yes, I signed it.
- 25 Q. [9:56:50] I kindly request the court officer to please display on the witness's

- 1 screen tab 1 of the Prosecution binder. The ERN, for the court record, is
- 2 CAR-OTP-2089-1229. And the document is confidential and should not be displayed
- 3 in the gallery, please.
- 4 Mr Witness, do you see a document on the screen in front of you?
- 5 A. [9:57:46] Yes.
- 6 Q. [9:57:50] And do you recognise any of the names on this page, Mr Witness?
- 7 A. [9:58:08] Yes, I do recognise a name.
- 8 Q. [9:58:19] And without telling us the name, please tell us whose names you
- 9 recognise.
- 10 A. [9:58:37] I recognise my name. I recognise the names of my father and my
- 11 mother. There's also my ethnic origin.
- 12 Q. [9:58:51] Thank you for that.
- 13 Could the court officer please scroll towards the bottom of the page. Thank you.
- 14 Mr Witness, do you recognise any other names on this part of the page? And please
- don't tell us whose names, if at all. Do not tell us the names themselves, just whose
- 16 names you recognise.
- 17 A. [9:59:36] I recognise these names. I recognise the three names.
- 18 Q. [9:59:45] And do you recognise the signatures on the page?
- 19 A. [10:00:01] Yes, I do recognise them.
- 20 Q. [10:00:07] Mr Witness, does -- you said that at the top of the page you
- 21 recognised your names.
- 22 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:00:16] Madam Prosecutor, you can ask him whose
- 23 signatures are those, please. Don't lead the witness.
- 24 MS NDAGIRE: [10:00:24]
- 25 Q. [10:00:25] Mr Witness, whose signatures do you see on this part of the page?

- 1 A. [10:00:43] I can see my signature and the signatures of the investigators from
- 2 the Office of the Prosecutor.
- 3 Q. [10:00:54] Thank you for that.
- 4 Could the court officer please turn to page 12 --
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:00:58] No, sorry, Madam Prosecutor, ask him
- 6 further. He says he could recognise his signature. Let us know which one is his
- 7 signature, of those three signatures, please.
- 8 MS NDAGIRE: [10:01:13]
- 9 Q. [10:01:13] Mr Witness, could you tell us which of the signatures that you have
- 10 just identified is yours?
- 11 A. [10:01:30] My signature is in the middle.
- 12 Q. [10:01:41] Thank you very much.
- 13 Could the court officer please turn to page 1240 of the same document. That's tab 1.
- 14 And this page also should not be displayed in the gallery.
- 15 Mr Witness, do you recognise the signature on this page on your screen?
- 16 A. [10:02:29] Yes, I recognise it. It's my signature.
- 17 Q. [10:02:38] Thank you very much.
- 18 Could the court officer please now display tab 5 of the Prosecution binder. And
- 19 the ERN, for the court record, is CAR-OTP-2091-3074. And this document is also
- 20 confidential and should not be displayed in the gallery.
- 21 Mr Witness, do you see a document on the screen in front of you?
- 22 A. [10:03:29] Yes, I see it.
- 23 Q. [10:03:35] And do you recognise any of the names on this page?
- 24 A. [10:03:49] Yes, I recognise them.
- 25 Q. [10:03:54] Whose names do you recognise?

- 1 A. [10:04:05] I recognise my name, the name of my father and the name of my
- 2 mother.
- 3 Q. [10:04:22] Apart from the names of your father and your mother, do you
- 4 recognise any other name on the page?
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:04:31] He said he recognised his name, his mum's
- 6 and his dad's. See if it's not in the transcript.
- 7 MS NDAGIRE: [10:04:42] Yes, indeed, I see it now.
- 8 Could the court officer please scroll down to the bottom of that page, please.
- 9 Q. [10:05:06] Mr Witness, do you recognise any names on that part of the page?
- 10 A. [10:05:22] Yes, I do.
- 11 Q. [10:05:29] Whose names do you recognise?
- 12 A. [10:05:41] I recognise my name and the names of the investigators.
- 13 Q. [10:05:55] Other than those names, do you recognise anything else on this part
- 14 of the page?
- 15 A. [10:06:13] No.
- 16 Q. [10:06:22] Do you see any signatures on this part of the page, Mr Witness?
- 17 A. [10:06:39] Yes, I see signatures. I see the signatures.
- 18 Q. [10:06:45] And if you recognise any of the signatures, please tell us which one.
- 19 A. [10:07:04] I recognise my signature.
- 20 Q. [10:07:11] And just so we are clear, where on the page does it appear?
- 21 A. [10:07:38] It appears on the page on the left-hand side.
- 22 Q. [10:07:45] Thank you very much.
- 23 Could the court officer please turn to page 3089 of the same document. And it also
- should not be displayed to the gallery.
- 25 Mr Witness, do you recognise the signature on this part of the page?

- 1 A. [10:08:25] Yes, I do.
- 2 Q. [10:08:28] Whose signature is it?
- 3 A. [10:08:44] It's my signature.
- 4 Q. [10:08:51] Thank you very much.
- 5 This document may be removed from the screen.
- 6 Madam President, for the next series of questions I would like us to go back into
- 7 private session.
- 8 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:09:05] Madam Court Officer, can we go briefly
- 9 into private session, please.
- 10 (Private session at 10.09 a.m.)
- 11 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:09:18] We're in private session, Madam President.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:09:23] Thank you.
- 13 Madam Prosecutor, carry on, please.
- 14 MS NDAGIRE: [10:09:28]
- 15 Q. [10:09:28] Mr Witness, we are now back in private session, so please feel free,
- when I ask you certain questions, to give us names or the basis of your knowledge of
- that information freely, as no one outside of this courtroom can hear you.
- 18 A. [10:09:54] Very well.
- 19 Q. [10:10:08] Mr Witness, do you know a place called OCRB?
- 20 A. [10:10:25] Yes, I know the OCRB.
- 21 Q. [10:10:31] Please tell the Court what the OCRB is.
- 22 A. [10:10:55] The OCRB is the place of detention of the *bandits*.
- 23 Q. [10:11:07] And how do you know it is the place of detention?
- A. [10:11:27] I know this place because it's a known -- a place that's known by all
- 25 the Central African Republic people. I would pass by and I continue to pass by this

- 1 place. It is known by the entire public.
- 2 THE INTERPRETER: [10:11:45] And the interpreter corrects that this was a place of
- 3 detention of bandits.
- 4 MS NDAGIRE: [10:11:55]
- 5 Q. [10:11:56] And where is the OCRB located?
- 6 A. [10:12:17] The OCRB is located close to the central market, going towards
- 7 Camp de Roux. There's a crossroads which goes towards the palais and before
- 8 getting to the OCRB there is a road which goes to the DCRP.
- 9 Q. [10:12:57] Have you ever been to the OCRB yourself, Mr Witness?
- 10 A. [10:13:14] It's a place that I know very well. I pass by regularly.
- 11 Q. [10:13:26] Did you ever pass by there in 2013, Mr Witness?
- 12 A. [10:13:47] Yes, I passed through there.
- 13 Q. [10:13:53] Why did you pass through there, Mr Witness?
- 14 A. [10:14:10] Within the framework of my activities, if I had to go to Kassai or to
- Ouango, I would pass by in front of the OCRB.
- 16 Q. [10:14:26] In 2013, were you ever inside the OCRB?
- 17 A. [10:14:49] I told you that in 2013 I passed by in front of it. I didn't enter it, but I
- 18 know the OCRB well.
- 19 Q. [10:15:08] What would happen at the OCRB, Mr Witness? If you know.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:15:18] When?
- 21 MS NDAGIRE: [10:15:21]
- 22 Q. [10:15:22] In 2013, what would happen at the OCRB?
- 23 A. [10:15:40] I have no idea.
- Q. [10:15:55] Mr Witness, at page 17 of this morning's transcript, it is recorded here
- 25 that you said, the interpreter corrects, that the OCRB was a place of detention of

- 1 bandits. And my question now is how do you know it was a place of detention of
- 2 bandits?
- 3 MR JACOBS: [10:16:32](Interpretation) Your Honour.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:16:33] Yes, Mr Jacobs.
- 5 MR JACOBS: [10:16:35](Interpretation) It seems to be the case that this question has
- 6 already been put and the witness has already replied. And I'm looking for
- 7 the reference here.
- 8 He said that everybody knew it. I knew this place because it was a place that was
- 9 known by the entirely Central African population. I went by in front of this place, it
- was known by the entire public. So that's in the French transcript, real time page 16,
- lines 10 to 13. So the question has already been put and the witness already
- 12 answered it.
- 13 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:17:05] Yeah, the question was to do with the place
- 14 itself, the building OCRB. He said he passed by that area and everybody knew that
- 15 was the building.
- 16 The question put by counsel is how this witness got to know that it was a place for,
- 17 for bandits. In other words, what was done inside the OCRB. You're overruled,
- 18 Mr Jacobs.
- 19 Please, Madam Prosecutor, carry on.
- 20 MS NDAGIRE: [10:17:44]
- 21 Q. [10:17:44] Mr Witness, I'll ask you the question again. How did you know
- 22 the OCRB was a place of detention of bandits or for bandits?
- A. [10:18:11] *In front of the OCRB compound there's a sign that says "I'OCRB".
- 24 And on both sides of the compound, there's this inscription "OCRB, Central African

office for the repression of banditry".

- 1 Q. [10:19:00] And other than the bandits, do you know who else was at the OCRB?
- 2 A. [10:19:25] I told you that the police were working at the OCRB. I have no idea
- 3 what their functions were.
- 4 Q. [10:19:48] Other than the police, do you know who else worked at the OCRB,
- 5 Mr Witness?
- 6 A. [10:20:14] It was the police who were working at the OCRB. I know that
- 7 civilians can't work there, at the OCRB.
- 8 Q. [10:20:26] And do you know who was in charge of the police at the OCRB?
- 9 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:20:38] Madam Prosecutor, can I ask that you
- streamline your question in such a way that we know the time, the period which
- 11 you are talking about, whether it's now, or whether it's 2013, or whether it's 2018, so
- that the witness can be maybe guided. Maybe your questions are too broad.
- 13 MS NDAGIRE: [10:21:02] I'm guided, your Honour. Thank you.
- 14 Q. [10:21:05] Mr Witness, in 2013, do you know who was in charge of the police
- who are working at the OCRB?
- 16 A. [10:21:26] No, I don't know.
- 17 MS NDAGIRE: [10:21:39] Madam Prosecutor, on the basis of the answer just given
- by the witness, I request if I could refresh his memory on the information he provided
- 19 at paragraph 20 of his second statement, whose ERN is CAR-OTP-2091-3074.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:22:08] 3074 or 3078, you mean, for paragraph 20
- 21 that you just referred to? It's on page 3078, yes?
- 22 MS NDAGIRE: [10:22:25] Yes, indeed, 3078 is the page where paragraph 20 appears.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:22:34] Now, I mean what about that paragraph?
- 24 What about that particular paragraph?
- 25 MS NDAGIRE: [10:22:41] At the fifth line he provides particular information about

- 1 who was in charge and, in the light of the response he gave just before I made
- 2 the request to refresh, there is an inconsistency there and so I wish to clarify -- refresh
- 3 his memory.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:23:03] When we looked at that paragraph you say
- 5 he referred to who was in charge of, you know -- I don't see any name there. We
- 6 looked at that paragraph, hence our decision. But let's allow you -- let's see what
- 7 you want to do. I don't see any name in that particular paragraph, that's why we
- 8 came up with that decision I read out before we started the testimony of this witness.
- 9 You can ask him.
- 10 MS NDAGIRE: [10:23:32] Thank you, Madam Prosecutor.
- 11 Q. [10:23:36] Mr Witness, in one of the statements that you gave to the investigators
- of the Office of the Prosecutor and I'm reading from paragraph 20 of that
- statement you said the following at line -- at line number 3, and I quote:
- 14 "When the vehicle stopped in the OCRB compound the Commander of our vehicle
- approached to Commander of the OCRB with a piece of paper."
- Now my question to you, firstly, is do you recall this event, do you recall having gone
- in a vehicle inside the compound of the OCRB?
- 18 A. [10:24:52] Yes, I remember.
- 19 Q. [10:24:59] And is it also correct that when the vehicle in which you were
- 20 approached stopped in the compound, that the commander of that vehicle
- 21 approached the commander of the OCRB with a piece of paper?
- 22 A. [10:25:32] Yes, that is correct. When our vehicle went through the gate of
- 23 the OCRB, the vehicle stopped. The commander who was on our vehicle got down
- 24 from the vehicle and the person in charge approached him. And this person who
- 25 was in charge provided the commander with a document, the commander who was

- 1 on our vehicle.
- 2 Q. [10:26:13] How did you know that this person who approached the commander
- 3 of your vehicle was the one in charge?
- 4 A. [10:26:43] For the entire duration of my detention, I never saw another person
- 5 give instructions. He was the person who gave orders for -- to beat us up. When
- 6 he was provided with a document, he was the one who gave instructions. Other
- 7 than him, there was nobody else who gave instructions, and it was for all these
- 8 reasons that I said that he was the person who was responsible, he was the one in
- 9 charge.
- 10 Q. [10:27:33] And just so we're clear, Mr Witness, when you say he was in charge,
- 11 who or what was he in charge of?
- 12 A. [10:27:58] He was the person in charge of the OCRB.
- 13 Q. [10:28:08] Thank you for that, Mr Witness.
- 14 I kindly request if the court officer could ...
- 15 Actually, we may now go back to public session, Madam President. Apology.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:28:38] Madam Court Officer, can we go back into
- 17 open session, please.
- 18 (Open session at 10.28 a.m.)
- 19 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:28:51] We're back in open session, Madam President.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:28:54] Thank you very much.
- 21 Madam Prosecutor, please carry on.
- 22 MS NDAGIRE: [10:28:59]
- 23 Q. [10:29:00] Mr Witness, we are back in open session, so please be careful not to
- 24 mention your names of any other people, and if you wish to, please let us know so we

25 can go back to private session.

- 1 My first question now is when was the last time you had an opportunity to read your
- 2 statements?
- 3 A. [10:29:41] That was two weeks ago.
- 4 Q. [10:29:49] And on that occasion were you able to provide any corrections or
- 5 clarifications to your statements?
- 6 A. [10:30:10] Yes, I provided some clarifications on my statement.
- 7 Q. [10:30:17] And were those clarifications recorded down by members of
- 8 the Office of the Prosecutor?
- 9 A. [10:30:43] Yes, they were recorded, and then I appended my signature to
- 10 the bottom of the document.
- 11 Q. [10:30:52] And were the clarifications that you provide -- excuse me, were
- 12 the clarifications that you provided, were they all truthful?
- 13 A. [10:31:13] Yes, it is the truth.
- 14 Q. [10:31:19] I kindly request if the court officer would please display tab 10 of
- the Prosecution binder. And the ERN of that document is CAR-OTP-00036082, and
- if page 3 of that document would please be displayed to only the witness, not in
- 17 the gallery.
- 18 Mr Witness, do you see a document on the screen in front of you?
- 19 A. [10:32:18] Yes, I can see it.
- 20 Q. [10:32:29] I apologise. Do you recognise any of the names or signatures that
- 21 appear on this page?
- 22 A. [10:32:52] Yes, I do recognise the name and the signature.
- Q. [10:33:02] And without telling us the name, could you tell us whose name you
- 24 recognise, firstly?
- 25 A. [10:33:24] I recognise my name and my signature.

- 1 Q. [10:33:31] Thank you for that, Mr Witness.
- 2 Now, Mr Witness, the Judges can use your statements and the documents that you
- 3 provided together with your statements as part of the evidence in this trial in order
- 4 for them to decide the truth. And my question for you is: do you have any
- 5 objections to this process?
- 6 A. [10:34:21] Could you please put your question again.
- 7 Q. [10:34:24] Yes, of course.
- 8 The Judges in this trial can use your statement and the information you've provided
- 9 today in this hearing to help them decide the truth of this case, but they can only do
- so if you do not object. So my question is: do you have any objection to the Judges
- using your statement and the annexes and the testimony you have given today?
- 12 * A. [10:35:17] I am in agreement with the Judges using my statements and the
- documents that I have provided.
- 14 Q. [10:35:29] Thank you very much, Mr Witness.
- 15 Madam President, that concludes my examination-in-chief. And I believe
- 16 I've -- we've met the procedural requirements for Rule 68(3) for the statement and
- 17 annexes.
- 18 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:35:49] Thank you very much, Madam Prosecutor.
- 19 The witness, being before the Chamber and him having agreed for the Chamber to
- 20 use his prior recorded testimony and the annex thereto, the Prosecution having
- 21 questioned the witness, the Defence and the Chamber will have an opportunity to
- 22 question -- question the witness, it is our decision, therefore, that the requirements of
- 23 Rule 68(3) of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence have been fulfilled.
- 24 So with that I am going to ask counsel for the victims to put questions to this witness.

25 Ms Pellet, please. Thank you.

- 1 MS PELLET: [10:36:50](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President.
- 2 So I do maintain my request of 27 February last to put questions to this witness.
- 3 And in performance or compliance with the decision of this morning, as my colleague
- 4 from the OTP has just met the requirements of 68(3), then * my questions will be
- 5 limited to the harm suffered by the witness during the events of 2013 and the impact
- 6 of these events on him and the members of his family.
- 7 QUESTIONED BY MS PELLET: (Interpretation)
- 8 Q. [10:37:26] Good morning, Mr Witness.
- 9 A. [10:37:34] Good morning.
- 10 Q. [10:37:38] We do know each other, but for the record I would like to say that
- 11 I am your legal representative because you have been accepted to participate in
- the procedure on 8 November 2023 on the basis of a form that we filled out together
- 13 on 5 May 2022.
- 14 And in this regard, Madam President, I would refer you also to paragraph 30 and 31
- 15 of our filings, ICC-01/14-01/21-518.
- Mr Witness, before I start putting questions to you I would like to remind you, as did
- 17 indeed Madam President this morning and my colleague from the OTP, of an
- 18 important thing.
- 19 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:38:35] Ms Pellet, can you speak a bit louder so that
- 20 the interpreters can hear you well. Thank you.
- 21 MS PELLET: [10:38:48](Interpretation) Yes, indeed, Madam President.
- Q. [10:38:52] So, Mr Witness, I'm going to remind you of an important matter this
- 23 morning, that you need, namely, to bear in mind in order to be free in your response
- 24 to my questions when providing us with all the information that you deem fit.
- 25 As Madam President and my learned friend of the OTP this morning reminded you,

- 1 if any of my questions might be identifying in nature I will be requesting to move into
- 2 private session so that only those present in the courtroom will be in a position to
- 3 hear the responses to my questions and that nobody will be able to identify you.
- 4 Now, if you are ever minded that a response to one of my questions might identify
- 5 you, please raise your hand and we will move into private session. Have you
- 6 understood, Mr Witness?
- 7 A. [10:39:47] Yes, I have understood only too well.
- 8 Q. [10:39:51] Very well. Thank you very much.
- 9 Now, Mr Witness, in your prior statement, and once again this morning in the French
- 10 version, page 21, lines 18 -- sorry, lines 8 to 10, and in English page 22 from line 5, you
- 11 explained that you were beaten up during your detention at the OCRB.
- 12 Did you benefit from any medical treatment subsequent to this beating?
- 13 A. [10:40:41] Not at all.
- 14 Q. [10:40:46] And when you were released, Mr Witness, did you benefit or receive
- 15 any medical treatment?
- 16 A. [10:41:06] No, I did not receive any medical treatment and nobody approached
- 17 me.
- 18 Q. [10:41:14] With regard to the beatings that you underwent at -- during your
- detention at the OCRB, did they leave any aftermath or traces today?
- 20 A. [10:41:33] Yes, there are still indeed traces of these beatings.
- 21 Q. [10:41:40] Could you please explain to the Court what these -- what this
- aftermath or these traces are?
- 23 A. [10:42:04] The after-effects that I suffer on a daily basis, or the repercussions, is
- 24 that I do not have the same level of physical strength that I had prior to the events
- 25 and every year the -- after what happened to me, the torture that I underwent is still

- 1 present in my mind. I was somebody who was not fearful of anything, but that is no
- 2 longer the case today. These are memories that are still very present and I still bear
- 3 the scars on my back of the torture that I underwent. I still have this very much in
- 4 my mind.
- 5 Q. [10:43:01] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 6 Since you were released from the OCRB, have you received any psychological
- 7 treatment?
- 8 A. [10:43:28] I did not receive any and have not received any to date.
- 9 Q. [10:43:36] Thank you, Mr Witness. I'm now going to move on to a series of
- 10 questions with regard to the consequences of your detention at the OCRB and
- 11 the torture that you experienced on you and your family.
- 12 Now, Mr Witness, I would like to remind you once again that we are in open session
- and that I can at any moment, if you so wish, move into private session so that you
- 14 will be free to express yourself when answering my questions; all right?
- 15 A. [10:44:19] Very well.
- 16 Q. [10:44:25] So we are still in open session.
- 17 What were the consequences upon your family of your arrest and detention during
- 18 the events of 2013?
- 19 A. [10:44:59] The consequences with regards to my family are multiple. Firstly, I
- 20 lost my father, because I am an only child and when I was arrested he couldn't deal
- 21 with it. He had a high blood pressure event and then, once I was released, he passed
- 22 away.
- 23 Secondly, I was the chief of the household and I had a number of people who were
- 24 dependent upon me. When I was arrested, I had a young girl, my niece, who had to

25 give up school and fell pregnant at the age of 14.

- 1 I also lost my equipment. Everything was looted, which meant that I ended up with
- 2 nothing. So those are the consequences of my arrest.
- 3 Q. [10:46:36] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 4 Mr Witness, what do you expect of the trial against Mr Said?
- 5 A. [10:47:00] My expectations of the trial against Mr Said are that everything that I
- 6 lost, whether it be the death of my father, or my niece who gave up schooling and fell
- 7 pregnant, and all of the property that I lost, will be, to some extent, compensated for.
- 8 That is what I expect of in terms of justice.
- 9 Q. [10:47:44] And why did you want to participate in the proceedings as a victim
- and why did you seek to testify today?
- 11 A. [10:47:58] I accepted to testify because I would like to help the -- help justice in
- my country, for human rights to be respected and in order for such treatment never to
- 13 happen again. And that those who intend to commit such acts in the future can
- 14 understand that justice does exist. That is why I decided to testify, for justice and
- 15 human rights to be respected for everyone the world over.
- 16 Q. [10:48:58] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 17 Madam President, I have no further questions and I thank you.
- 18 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:49:07] Thank you very much, Ms Pellet.
- 19 Now, Mr Witness, we are going to allow counsel for the Defence, for Mr Said, to put
- 20 some questions to you in cross-examination.
- 21 Ms Naouri, you may start your cross-examination now and we'll continue during
- 22 the next session. Thank you.
- 23 MS NAOURI: [10:49:35](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President.
- 24 The cross-examination for this witness will be led by Mr Jacobs.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:49:45] Thank you very much.

- 1 Mr Jacobs, then, your witness, please.
- 2 MR JACOBS: [10:50:13](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President.
- 3 QUESTIONED BY MR JACOBS: (Interpretation)
- 4 Q. [10:50:18] Good morning, Mr Witness.
- 5 A. [10:50:25] Good morning.
- 6 Q. [10:50:27] My name is Dov Jacobs and I'm going to be putting a number of
- 7 questions to you today on behalf of the Defence for Mr Said. As the Presiding Judge
- 8 explained, everything that we say is being interpreted and transcribed, so it is
- 9 important for us to speak slowly and for us to wait a little bit after my question, your
- 10 response, and my next question, for everything to be taken down into the record.
- 11 Is that all right, Mr Witness?
- 12 A. [10:51:07] Absolutely.
- 13 (Counsel confers)
- 14 MR JACOBS: [10:51:29](Interpretation) So, I believe it would be preferable for us to
- move into private session for the first series of questions, please, Madam President.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:51:44] Madam Court Officer, can we go briefly
- 17 into private session, please.
- 18 (Private session at 10.52 a.m.)
- 19 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:52:05] We're in private session, Madam President.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:52:07] Thank you very much.
- 21 Mr Jacobs, your witness, please.
- 22 MR JACOBS: [10:52:10](Interpretation) Thank you.
- 23 Q. [10:52:17] So, Mr Witness, when did you start to work (Redacted)?
- 24 What year was that?
- 25 A. [10:52:34] I started to work as (Redacted) in the year 1995.

- 1 Q. [10:52:47] And did you always work for yourself independently or did you
- 2 work for somebody else?
- 3 A. [10:53:12] I started working for somebody before setting myself up
- 4 independently.
- 5 Q. [10:53:28] When did you open your own (Redacted), in which year?
- 6 A. [10:53:39] I opened my own (Redacted)in the year 2005.
- 7 Q. [10:53:56] Who financed the opening of your (Redacted), Mr Witness?
- 8 A. [10:54:11] I started saving money when I was working for somebody else, and
- 9 then I (Redacted).
- 10 THE INTERPRETER: [10:54:31] Correction: I (Redacted)
- 11 (Redacted).
- 12 MR JACOBS: [10:54:37](Interpretation)
- 13 Q. [10:54:38] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 14 So I am quoting transcript 9, page 5 of the French transcript, you say that you are still
- 15 working (Redacted), so you have been working
- 16 continuously, as such, since 2013; is that correct?
- 17 A. [10:55:03] That is correct.
- 18 Q. [10:55:10] And today your (Redacted) is still in the same location, is it?
- 19 A. [10:55:22] No, my (Redacted) is no longer in the same location.
- 20 Q. [10:55:48] Did you have the (Redacted) alone or with somebody else,
- 21 Mr Witness?
- 22 A. [10:56:02] I run the (Redacted) alone.
- 23 Q. [10:56:16] Just to be clear, apart from being (Redacted), did you have
- 24 any other trade?
- 25 A. [10:56:30] No, I didn't have another trade.

- 1 Q. [10:56:46] Very well, Mr Witness.
- 2 Now, whilst we are still in private session, could you please tell us whether you have
- 3 any brothers?
- 4 A. [10:57:06] I think I told you that I am an only son.
- 5 (Counsel confers)
- 6 MR JACOBS: [10:57:29](Interpretation)
- 7 Q. [10:57:31] Very well, Mr Witness.
- 8 Madam Courtroom Officer, could we please bring up tab 12 of our list of evidence,
- 9 please. That is CAR-OTP-00036089. But if you could just show it to the courtroom,
- please, and not to the witness, for reasons of confidentiality, please.
- So, Mr Witness, we have an investigator's report from the OTP that has attributed
- 12 a number of telephone numbers to you, and I just wanted to check those telephone
- 13 numbers with you; all right?
- 14 A. [10:58:54] Very well.
- 15 Q. [10:58:56] So the first number that appears on this document, could we please
- scroll down, just for the record, it is page 00003, so that's the third page of
- 17 the document, please.
- 18 So the first number that appears is the (Redacted). Do you recognise that number,
- 19 Mr Witness?
- 20 A. [10:59:38] I do recognise it.
- 21 Q. [10:59:45] Is this a number that you were using in the year 2013, Mr Witness?
- 22 A. [10:59:56] Yes, that was the number that I was using during that period of time.
- 23 Q. [11:00:08] Thank you.
- 24 The second number is (Redacted). Do you recognise this number, Mr Witness?
- 25 A. [11:00:27] I do recognise it. That was my very first number and I was using it

- 1 well before the 72 number and I'm still using it today.
- 2 Q. [11:00:46] So just to be clear, you were also using that number in 2013, were
- 3 you?
- 4 A. [11:00:57] Yes. That's clear. I was using those two numbers.
- 5 Q. [11:01:05] Thank you very much, Mr Witness.
- 6 And one last number, so that's (Redacted), does that number ring a bell?
- 7 A. [11:01:27] Yes, that is my Azure number and I was using it at the time, but
- 8 the operating company closed its doors. But at that time I was also using that
- 9 number.
- 10 Q. [11:01:53] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 11 Madam President, I can see what time it is. It might be a good time to take the break.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [11:02:00] Yes, certainly.
- 13 Mr Witness, we are going to have a short break. We will come back at 11.30, to
- 14 continue with your cross-examination.
- 15 So I rise the Court and ask that we come back at 11.30, please.
- 16 THE COURT USHER: [11:02:15] All rise.
- 17 (Recess taken at 11.02 a.m.)
- 18 (Upon resuming in private session at 11.32 a.m.)
- 19 THE COURT USHER: [11:32:05] All rise.
- 20 Please be seated.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [11:32:25] Good morning again, everyone.
- 22 Good morning, Mr Witness. We are going to continue with your cross-examination
- 23 by counsel Jacobs.
- 24 Mr Jacobs, your witness, please. Cross-examination continues. Just so you know,
- 25 we're in private session. We're still in private session.

- 1 MS MAKWAIA: [11:32:53] I beg your indulgence, Madam President, before counsel
- 2 continues. We've just been joined by our legal intern, Mr Mamadou Fofana, at the
- 3 back of counsel table, for the information of the Court.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [11:33:13] Thank you very much, Ms Makwaia.
- 5 Welcome, Mr Fofana. Hope you enjoy the proceedings. Thank you very much.
- 6 Mr Jacobs, continue, please.
- 7 MR JACOBS: [11:33:23](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour.
- 8 Q. [11:33:28] Good morning once again, Witness.
- 9 A. [11:33:41] Good morning.
- 10 Q. [11:33:50] As the Presiding Judge indicated, we are in private session and I am
- going to continue with my questions. So I would like to go back a moment to the
- 12 events that led to the judgment that you were subject to. In your statement, your
- previous statement, you indicated that you were released after your judgment,
- 14 Witness. That is correct, is it not?
- 15 A. [11:34:20] Yes, that's correct. That's the way it went.
- 16 Q. [11:34:28] Very well. If I understand well, you were released. The judges
- 17 considered that you were innocent?
- 18 A. [11:34:39] Yes, that's correct.
- 19 Q. [11:34:54] Very well. And the judgment was on (Redacted), was it not,
- 20 Mr Witness?
- 21 A. [11:35:16] Yes, that is correct.
- 22 Q. [11:35:20] Very well.
- 23 Court officer, could we show tab 33 of our list of notification, that is the item
- 24 CAR-OTP-2135-3202, and this item can be shown to the witness. So the page -- if

you could show the page 3232.

- 1 Perfect, thank you.
- 2 Witness, do you see a document?
- 3 A. [11:36:25] Yes, I can see a document on the screen.
- 4 Q. [11:36:35] Very well. Now, this is a register of the tribunal of *grande instance* in
- 5 Bangui where they transcribe different decisions issued by the tribunal in Bangui, in
- 6 (Redacted), and we can see -- do you see, Witness, (Redacted)
- 7 (Redacted)?
- 8 A. [11:37:15] Yes, I can see it.
- 9 THE INTERPRETER: [11:37:18] (Redacted), corrects the interpreter.
- 10 MR JACOBS: [11:37:25] (Interpretation) If we can go a bit further down in the page.
- 11 Q. [11:37:31] Do you remember if other people who were tried with you were
- 12 released?
- 13 A. [11:37:43] Some people were released and others were sentenced.
- 14 Q. [11:38:07] Very well. And so your co-detainees, (Redacted), were they also
- 15 released? (Redacted), was he, like you, also released?
- 16 A. [11:38:29] I was with (Redacted). * The person who I do remember being
- 17 released was (Redacted) and myself. (Redacted), where it concerns him, I think he
- was sentenced, as well as other people, but I do remember (Redacted)
- 19 (Redacted) and myself, we were released.
- 20 Q. [11:39:11] Very well. If we could move the document to the right, you can see
- 21 the name (Redacted). And if we go -- and there you can read (Redacted)
- 22 (Redacted). Does that refresh your memory,
- 23 Witness?
- 24 A. [11:39:44] Yes. Yes, it does remind me of something.
- 25 Q. [11:40:23] Now, Witness, you've just spoken to us about (Redacted).

- 1 Could the court officer show us tab 13. This is the document CAR-OTP-2042 -- and
- 2 this document can be shown to the witness. CAR-OTP-2043-0479. It can be shown
- 3 to the witness.
- 4 Thank you, court officer. So if we could zoom in on the document -- the top of the
- 5 document.
- 6 Witness, can you see the document?
- 7 A. [11:41:43] Yes, I can see it on the screen.
- 8 Q. [11:41:50] This is a judgment of the decision of the correctional tribunal
- 9 concerning (Redacted), and the decision indicates that he was released.
- 10 If we can just go down a bit. Thank you.
- 11 Did you have a similar document after your judgment, a written out document such
- 12 as this?
- 13 A. [11:42:42] After our trial, we were released. After that, I also received a
- document like this, a liberation document or a freeing document.
- 15 Q. [11:43:02] Indeed, we're going to speak about that in a moment. But you didn't
- 16 receive a document such as this, which is the decision of -- on release concerning
- 17 yourself?
- 18 A. [11:43:28] Yes, I did receive this type of decision with regard to my release.
- 19 Q. [11:43:41] Very good, Witness. On the screen, if you have a look, the first name
- 20 to be seen that we can see at the top and I will help you read it is Yolande
- 21 Mamia-Yamathia. Yolande Mamia-Yamathia. Do you see it, Witness?
- 22 A. [11:44:16] Yes, I can see it.
- 23 Q. [11:44:24] Do you remember who that was?
- 24 A. [11:44:44] I don't remember very well. I don't remember this name very well.
- 25 But I do remember at the time that this was a lady who was the prosecutor when we

- 1 were being tried.
- 2 Q. [11:44:59] Yes, that's exactly correct. "MP" that you can see is ministère public, in
- 3 French; prosecutor, in English. So she was the prosecutor, as you say.
- 4 Do you remember if she was present during the entire proceedings?
- 5 A. [11:45:27] Can you go back to your question. You were speaking about the
- 6 lady. I don't understand your question well. Please, could you go back and repeat
- 7 your question.
- 8 Q. [11:45:40] Yes, Witness. I was speaking about the lady, the lady that you
- 9 indicated as being the prosecutor during your trial. Was she present in the
- 10 courtroom with you and the judges?
- 11 A. [11:46:02] Yes, she was there. She was playing her role in the prosecution team.
- 12 Q. [11:46:31] Thank you, Witness. Now, to the best of your knowledge, did this
- lady, did she remain as prosecutor after 2013? If you know.
- 14 A. [11:46:46] No, after I was released, I don't know anything. I have no
- information about her.
- 16 Q. [11:47:06] Thank you, Witness.
- 17 Now, if we could once again show tab 33 on our list of notification,
- 18 CAR-OTP-2135-3202.
- 19 And you have pages 32 -- page 3233.
- 20 And this document can be shown to the witness.
- 21 Witness, I don't know if you can see the document.
- 22 A. [11:48:11] Yes, I can see it.
- 23 Q. [11:48:24] Do you see your name on this document, Witness?
- 24 A. [11:48:34] Yes, I see my name.
- 25 Q. [11:48:47] Witness, do you know for what crime or offence you were being

- 1 prosecuted for?
- 2 A. [11:49:02] I'd been arrested and afterwards I was put -- we were put in prison.
- 3 We were told that it was because of flyers that we were put in detention.
- 4 Q. [11:49:27] Thank you, Witness.
- 5 Now, in the document that you've got in front of you, we can see that it's written "act
- 6 which compromises national security." Do you see that, Witness?
- 7 A. [11:49:53] Yes, I can see it.
- 8 Q. [11:50:05] Very well. Do you know what that means, Witness?
- 9 A. [11:50:24] Yes, I've understood it well.
- 10 Q. [11:50:46] Thank you, Witness.
- 11 Court officer, could you show tab 29 of our list of notification, CAR-OTP-2001-3199
- 12 and page 3243 thereof. That document can be shown to the witness. If we can
- zoom in on Article 295, which is a bit further down, if you would be so kind.
- 14 Thank you very much.
- 15 Do you see the document?
- 16 A. [11:52:06] Yes, I can see it.
- 17 Q. [11:52:11] So this is the Central African criminal code adopted in 2010. And if
- 18 you look at Article 295, I'm going to help you to read it. It states:
- 19 "Any manoeuvre or act of a nature to compromise public security or to give rise to
- 20 serious political trouble, provoking hatred of the government, breaching the laws of
- 21 the country, will be punished by an imprisonment of five years."
- 22 MS MAKWAIA: [11:52:51] Sorry, Madam President. I think the article he read
- 23 states, "from one year to five."
- 24 THE INTERPRETER: "... will be punished with a sentence of imprisonment from

one to five years."

- 1 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [11:53:17] Thank you very much, Mr Interpreter.
- 2 Thank you.
- 3 (Counsel confers)
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [11:53:30] Yes, carry on.
- 5 MR JACOBS: [11:53:31](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour. Yes, perhaps there
- 6 was a problem with the interpretation indeed. That's what's written there in
- 7 Article 295, that -- a sentence from one to five years. I confirm that.
- 8 Q. [11:53:57] So, Witness, what I've just read to you is the definition of what you
- 9 were accused of. Do you recognise this provision?
- 10 A. [11:54:19] These are the accusations against me, but I have not committed these
- 11 acts.
- 12 Q. [11:54:35] Thank you, Witness.
- 13 We can remove the document, court officer.
- 14 Indeed, Witness, as we discussed earlier, you were released following the judgment.
- 15 Could you tell us a bit more about the reasons as to why you were released.
- 16 A. [11:55:17] They released me because there was no evidence. I wasn't the one
- 17 who had done all of that. After -- according to their investigations, they concluded
- that I'd done nothing, and I was released.
- 19 And that's the reason why I was given the all clear and that's the reason why I was
- 20 released. I was exonerated.
- 21 THE INTERPRETER: [11:55:45] Corrects the interpreter.
- 22 MR JACOBS: [11:55:48](Interpretation)
- 23 Q. [11:55:49] Very well. So you told us that other people were released at the
- 24 same time as you. Do you remember the reasons as to why they were released, if

25 you remember?

- 1 A. [11:56:13] I don't know why they were released or why they had been arrested.
- 2 Q. [11:56:56] Perfect. So, Witness, you told us a minute ago, and this is page 39,
- 3 line 1, that there was an issue related to pamphlets or flyers. With regards to these
- 4 flyers, did that come up at the hearing? Were they presented during the hearing?
- 5 A. [11:57:29] They didn't show anything during the trial. Didn't show anything,
- 6 they didn't speak about what I had done. I didn't see these flyers.
- 7 Q. [11:57:43] Very well. So nobody discussed these flyers during the hearing, or
- 8 the content of the flyers, or if there was a paper document that was discussed during
- 9 your trial?
- 10 A. [11:58:11] Nobody brought a document or the flyers in question.
- 11 Q. [11:58:34] Thank you, Witness.
- 12 So you were released with other people. Now, for the people who were sentenced,
- do you remember the reasons given by the judge at the hearing?
- 14 A. [11:59:01] I don't remember.
- 15 Q. [11:59:15] Thank you.
- 16 Court officer, if you could show once again tab 33 of the list, this is the same register.
- 17 I will give you the ERN once again, CAR-OTP-2135-3202. If we could go to
- 18 page 3232.
- 19 Thank you. If we could please scroll down a little bit further.
- 20 Mr Witness, we can see here that one of your co-accused, (Redacted), appealed. Can
- 21 you see the word "appel" written in red?
- 22 A. [12:00:36] Yes, I can see it on the screen.
- 23 Q. [12:00:46] Very well.
- 24 Could we please go on to the next page, please, Madam Courtroom Officer. So if we

could please scroll down to the bottom of the page. Thank you.

- 1 Mr Witness, can you see that we can see that (Redacted), another of
- 2 your co-accused, also appealed. Can you see that, Mr Witness?
- 3 A. [12:01:34] Yes, I can see that.
- 4 Q. [12:01:43] Very well.
- 5 Madam Courtroom Officer, could we please move on to the next page.
- 6 Thank you.
- 7 So, you can see that other of your co-accused also appealed.
- 8 If we could please scroll down on that page.
- 9 Mr Witness, can you see that?
- 10 A. [12:02:42] Yes, I can see that up on the screen.
- 11 Q. [12:02:51] Thank you.
- 12 Madam Courtroom Officer, could we please move on to the next page, I believe that's
- 13 3235. If we could please scroll down on this page.
- 14 So, Mr Witness, you can see that your co-accused appealed. Can you see that from
- 15 the page?
- 16 A. [12:03:29] Yes, I can see their names on the screen.
- 17 Q. [12:03:38] Very well.
- 18 And last page, please, page 3236, Madam Courtroom Officer.
- 19 Mr Witness, can you see that your co-accused on that day also lodged an appeal?
- 20 A. [12:04:13] Yes, I can see it and I have seen their names.
- 21 Q. [12:04:23] Very well.
- 22 So, Mr Witness, to your knowledge, how did the appeals proceedings unfold for all of
- 23 these individuals?
- 24 MS MAKWAIA: [12:04:32] Objection, Madam President.
- 25 Counsel has delineated the names of individuals who launched an appeal following a

- 1 process, and it's clear from this list that this witness did not appeal. Our objection is
- 2 he's calling to this witness to speculate in the manner in which the appeals proceeded.
- 3 He is not one of the appellates.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:05:02] Well, I think this -- anyway, Mr Jacobs,
- 5 please respond.
- 6 MR JACOBS: [12:05:20](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President. Well, I
- 7 asked the witness whether to his knowledge he knew how the appeals proceedings
- 8 unfolded. I didn't ask him to speculate. If he knows, he can respond. If he does
- 9 not know, then he can't, Madam President.
- 10 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:05:39] Well, definitely, if he does not know he will
- say so. But I do recall this witness say that after his release -- I think at paragraph 57
- of his second statement he did mention the three of them who were released, as
- 13 you've rightly referred to in this particular exhibit, tab 33, that we are looking at now.
- 14 But he did say that after he's released -- his release, you know, he knows nothing
- about what happened at his place of detention, whether it was the Ngaragba prison or
- 16 the -- it was no longer the OCRB, but definitely if he followed the proceedings, he
- 17 could tell us, Madam Prosecutor. If he did not follow, he will also tell us. I
- understand, I appreciate your objection, but let's allow the witness to tell us.
- 19 Mr Jacobs, please.
- 20 Mr Witness, do you know what happened during the appeal of these, your
- 21 co-detainees, at the period concerned? If you don't know, you can tell us. If you
- 22 know, tell us also. Thank you.
- 23 THE WITNESS: [12:07:18](Interpretation) When they lodged an appeal, I was not
- 24 there, nor did I even know that they had lodged an appeal.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:07:28] Thank you very much.

- 1 Mr Jacobs, continue, please.
- 2 MR JACOBS: [12:07:33](Interpretation)
- 3 Q. [12:07:54](Microphone not activated)
- 4 THE INTERPRETER: [12:08:00] Microphone, please, counsel.
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:08:05] Can you speak into the microphone,
- 6 Mr Jacobs.
- 7 MR JACOBS: [12:08:14](Interpretation) Yes, I don't know what happened. I had
- 8 switched it on. So I shall repeat my question, yes.
- 9 Q. [12:08:22] Mr Witness, did you remain in contact with most of your co-accused
- after the year 2013?
- 11 A. [12:08:43] No, I no longer have any contact with them and I have not contacted
- 12 anybody.
- 13 Q. [12:08:55] Very well.
- 14 So, Mr Witness, when your second statement was taken in October 2018, you
- provided the Office of the Prosecutor with a list of 12 individuals.
- 16 That's annex 2 to your statement, that's tab 8 on our list of evidence. Could it please
- be brought up. So it is CAR-OTP-2091-3092.
- 18 Thank you very much, Madam Courtroom Officer.
- 19 THE COURT OFFICER: [12:10:17] Counsel, do you want the evidence to be shown
- 20 to the witness?
- 21 MR JACOBS: [12:10:25](Interpretation) Yes, indeed, Madam Courtroom Officer, this
- 22 document can be shown to the witness. Could we please scroll down to the bottom
- 23 of the document, please.
- 24 Q. [12:10:51] Can you see this, Mr Witness?
- 25 A. [12:10:58] Yes, I can see the document very well.

- 1 Q. [12:11:01] Do you recognise your signature, Mr Witness?
- 2 A. [12:11:07] Yes, I do recognise my signature.
- 3 Q. [12:11:13] Very well.
- 4 Could we please scroll up, Madam Courtroom Officer, scroll up the document.
- 5 So you can see it is written in English at the top that you provided the list of
- 6 individuals detained with yourself in relation to the pamphlet incident, in English,
- 7 and there's a list of names here with telephone numbers.
- 8 Can you confirm that you supplied this list of names and telephone numbers to the
- 9 OTP in 2018?
- 10 A. [12:12:14] Yes, that is correct. I am the one who handed this list over.
- 11 Q. [12:12:31] And so when in 2018 you furnished this list of names to the OTP you
- say that you have not spoken to those individuals between 2013 and 2018; is that what
- 13 you were telling us, Mr Witness?
- 14 A. [12:12:56] Yes.
- 15 Q. [12:13:08] So in the year 2018 when the OTP asked you to provide the names,
- 16 you remembered all the first names and family names and all the telephone numbers
- 17 of those individuals by heart, did you?
- 18 A. [12:13:31] Yes, indeed. After we were released, when we were leaving the
- 19 prison, we exchanged numbers, so I noted down all these telephone numbers in my
- 20 little book and then I consulted my little book, my notebook, in order to give those
- 21 numbers to the OTP.
- 22 Q. [12:14:04] Could we please scroll down. Well, that's perfect. Thank you.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:14:19] Mr Jacobs, do you still want us to remain in
- 24 private session?
- 25 MR JACOBS: [12:14:30](Interpretation) Well, it's difficult to say so in advance,

- 1 Madam President, but in view of the matters I'm going to be broaching, his detention,
- 2 his co-accused, I find it somewhat delicate to go into open session because it's the
- 3 witness's personal experience. You never know, we cannot anticipate when he
- 4 might say something that is identifying, Madam President.
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [12:15:00] That's fine. Carry on with your questions,
- 6 please.
- 7 MR JACOBS: [12:15:12](Interpretation)
- 8 Q. [12:15:12] Mr Witness, can you see the entries here.
- 9 One moment, Madam Courtroom Officer, please don't bring up the document again.
- 10 Yes, I do apologise. I do apologise, Madam Courtroom Officer. You can indeed
- bring up the document again. I do have one more question to put to the witness.
- 12 Would you like me to provide you with the reference again? Oh, there it is. Could
- 13 you please scroll down to the bottom.
- 14 Mr Witness, with regard to entry number 11, it's written in English and I'm going to
- translate it: "(Redacted), doesn't know his number."
- 16 So, Mr Witness, how did you know where (Redacted) lived in the year 2018?
- 17 A. [12:16:51] When we were arrested, we were all together and when we were
- talking to each other, each person would say where they were living, their
- 19 neighbourhood, and that's when (Redacted) told us about his neighbourhood. That
- 20 was because we were all arrested together. And during that period, he did not have
- 21 a telephone. That's what I know.
- 22 Q. [12:17:25] Very well, Mr Witness.
- 23 So we can see entry number 12, "(Redacted), he
- 24 doesn't have a phone." So is that a piece of information that you had in the year 2018,

25 Mr Witness?

- 1 A. [12:17:46] Well, (Redacted), we were all retained together. I would repeat the
- 2 same thing. Because we would say where we were living, each and every one of us
- 3 would say where we were living. That's how I know some numbers and I know
- 4 some neighbourhoods.
- 5 Q. [12:18:13] Very well, Mr Witness.
- 6 We can withdraw the document, Madam Courtroom Officer. Thank you.
- 7 Now, Mr Witness, to your knowledge, did the individuals who were convicted, your
- 8 co-accused who were convicted, did they do any prison, that is to say after the
- 9 judgment, did they return to prison?
- 10 A. [12:19:16] No, I do not have any information about them.
- 11 Q. [12:19:34] Now, Mr Witness, is it also the case for (Redacted) whom you knew
- 12 beforehand, did you not?
- 13 A. [12:20:15] Yes, that is true. I knew (Redacted) well beforehand.
- 14 Q. [12:20:29] Very well. So you knew (Redacted) well beforehand and he helped
- 15 you in your (Redacted); is that correct?
- 16 A. [12:20:43] Yes, that is correct.
- 17 Q. [12:20:50] So you're saying that after your release, you did not have any further
- 18 contact with (Redacted); is that correct?
- 19 A. [12:21:07] After my release, I might have met (Redacted), but we were no longer
- 20 together as we were in the past. I did see him after my release, that is true.
- 21 Q. [12:21:26] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 22 So, Madam Court Officer, could we please bring up tab number 15 on our list. So
- 23 that is CAR-OTP-2136-0699. And this document can be shown to the witness. I do
- 24 apologise, I should have told you that.
- 25 So that would be page 0704, Madam Court Officer.

- 1 So, we have seen that your judgment was handed down on (Redacted),
- 2 Mr Witness. Do you remember when your trial took place?
- 3 A. [12:23:44] I do remember.
- 4 Q. [12:23:53] What date was that, Mr Witness?
- 5 A. [12:24:06] As to the precise date of the trial, I no longer recall.
- 6 Q. [12:24:15] Very well.
- 7 So, Madam Courtroom Officer, could we please scroll down towards the bottom of
- 8 the page, the page that we have before us, please. Thank you.
- 9 So you can see, Mr Witness, written "(Redacted)
- 10 (Redacted)". Can you see that, Mr Witness?
- 11 A. [12:24:48] Yes, I can see that.
- 12 Q. [12:25:00] Does that refresh your memory with regards to the date, Mr Witness?
- 13 A. [12:25:08] Yes, it does enable me to remember.
- 14 Q. [12:25:25] Very well, Mr Witness.
- Now, could we please bring up page 0708, please.
- 16 Thank you very much, Madam Courtroom Officer. Could we please scroll down a
- 17 little bit further. Thank you.
- 18 Mr Witness, can you recognise a name on that page?
- 19 A. [12:26:16] Yes, I do.
- 20 Q. [12:26:34] Sorry, I didn't hear the interpretation. It might be an issue.
- 21 THE INTERPRETER: [12:26:41] Repeated from the English booth: The witness said,
- 22 "Yes, I do."
- 23 MR JACOBS: [12:26:52](Interpretation)
- 24 Q. [12:26:53] Mr Witness, can you see this well?
- 25 A. [12:26:58] Yes, I can.

- 1 Q. [12:27:14] Well, we'll try, but there's no longer any lights and I no longer know
- 2 which channel I'm on anymore.
- Well, let's continue like this.
- 4 So, we have here the notes taken by the court clerk during your trial.
- 5 And I would like for us to please bring up the next page, 0709, Madam Courtroom
- 6 Officer, please. Could we zoom in on the top. Yes, thank you.
- 7 So, at the top, we see that during your hearing there was a counsel who acted on your
- 8 behalf, Maître Morouba. Can you see that, Mr Witness?
- 9 A. [12:28:32] Yes, I can see that.
- 10 Q. [12:28:36] So that is counsel who assisted you at the hearing during your trial; is
- 11 that correct?
- 12 A. [12:28:55] That is correct.
- 13 Q. [12:28:58] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 14 Could you tell us a little bit more about how you came to choose said counsel?
- 15 A. [12:29:08] When we were arrested, there was a procedure where lawyers were
- placed at our disposal. * And it was the state who placed them at our disposal. They
- 17 were court appointed.
- Q. [12:29:55] Very well. And to your knowledge, were there any other lawyers –
- 19 you say that there were a number of lawyers that were appointed by the court. I see
- 20 the name of Morouba here. Were there any others who were assigned by the court?
- 21 A. [12:30:44] Yes, there were other lawyers.
- 22 Q. [12:30:57] Thank you.
- 23 If you can remember, could you provide us with their names?
- 24 A. [12:31:09] There was a counsel by the name of Denis Modemade and there was
- 25 also Maître Sarasengue. There was Maître Madoukou was also present.

- 1 I think that those are the individuals that I remember.
- 2 * Q. [12:32:19] So subsequent to your judgment on (Redacted), you were
- 3 immediately released; is that correct?
- 4 A. [12:32:46] Yes. I was immediately released after the judgment.
- 5 Q. [12:33:12] Now, you told us a moment ago, I'm sorry, I don't have the exact
- 6 reference, but that you had papers linked to your release.
- 7 I would like the court officer to show -- yes, tab 4 of our notification list. And this is
- 8 the document CAR-OTP-2089-1242 and this document can be shown to the witness.
- 9 Do you see the document, Witness?
- 10 A. [12:34:19] Yes, I can see the document.
- 11 Q. [12:34:28] Very well. And is this the document that you were speaking about a
- moment ago when you spoke about a document relating to your release?
- 13 A. [12:34:43] Yes, this is the document I was speaking about.
- 14 Q. [12:34:54] Do you know who wrote this document, Witness?
- 15 A. [12:35:18] Well, the document was drafted by the tribunal of grand instance of
- 16 Bangui after the judgment. After the judgment, we were provided with this
- document and we were released. And it was the tribunal that wrote this document.
- 18 Q. [12:35:41] Very well, Witness. Just to have understood this well.
- 19 Now, you were provided with this certificate of release. The tribunal -- it was the
- 20 tribunal that did that directly; is that correct?
- 21 A. [12:36:11] Yes, that was after the judgment, we were provided with this
- 22 document.
- 23 Q. [12:36:28] And with this certification of release, did they also provide you with a
- 24 copy of the judgment?
- 25 A. [12:36:48] No, I didn't receive any other document.

- 1 Q. [12:37:04] Very well.
- 2 And would you confirm that you gave this document to the investigators of the Office
- 3 of the Prosecutor, Witness?
- 4 A. [12:37:16] Yes, that's correct. I'm the person who provided them with this
- 5 document.
- 6 Q. [12:37:35] Witness, you can see on the screen this is a photograph of the
- 7 document. Do you still have the original of this document?
- 8 A. [12:38:01] Yes, I have it.
- 9 Q. [12:38:14] Very well. Would you agree, if necessary, for the original to be
- 10 consulted by the Court?
- 11 A. [12:38:34] Yes, I agree.
- 12 Q. [12:38:46] Thank you, Witness.
- Now, you just told us, Witness, and this is on page 53, line 5, "No, I didn't receive
- 14 another document." Would you confirm that you said that, Witness?
- 15 A. [12:39:17] Yes. All the documents that were given to me I still have in my
- 16 possession. If I'm asked to present them, I'm going to do so.
- 17 Q. [12:39:44] Thank you, Witness.
- 18 I'm just going to put the question to you again to be sure that everything has been
- 19 well noted, Witness.
- Now, you've just said in the French version, it is written "all the documents" in plural,
- 21 "All the documents that were given to me are still in my possession." Could you tell
- 22 us clearly what documents were provided to you.
- 23 A. [12:40:23] Certain documents I was provided with are not with me for the
- 24 moment. But if you want, I can bring them with the originals. The documents
- 25 which you've shown on the screen and other documents as well, I can go into my

- 1 archives to find them and bring them, if you wish that I do so.
- 2 Q. [12:40:55] Absolutely, Witness. It's very useful for the Court to have all the
- documents that you have linked to your trial and your judgment, so if you have any
- 4 other documents in addition to those on the screen, then we would be very grateful if
- 5 you could bring -- show them to us -- provide us with them.
- 6 A. [12:41:33] No problem. I can bring you all the documentation that was
- 7 provided to me when I was released. There is no problem.
- 8 Q. [12:41:48] Thank you very much, Witness.
- 9 Now, on the subject of documentation, I would now, Court Officer, like for tab 16 on
- our notification list to be shown. This is CAR-OTP-00025571 and it can be shown to
- 11 the witness. And we have to show page 13 thereof.
- 12 Do you see the document, Witness?
- 13 A. [12:42:55] Yes, I see the document. This document -- well, I still have the
- 14 original of this document.
- 15 Q. [12:43:13] Very well.
- 16 So what we can see here, for the record, that this is a release order. It's a document
- 17 which concerns you, does it not?
- 18 A. [12:43:29] Yes, this document concerns me, yes.
- 19 Q. [12:43:39] Can you see the date on the document, Witness?
- 20 A. [12:43:50] Yes, I can see it.
- 21 Q. [12:44:01] It's (Redacted), is it not, Witness?
- 22 A. [12:44:13] Yes, that's correct.
- 23 Q. [12:44:25] At what time or when did you obtain this document, Witness?
- 24 A. [12:44:35] When it was the same day as my release. I got it on the day that

25 I was released.

- 1 Q. [12:45:07] You didn't provide this document to the Office of the Prosecutor
- 2 when you met them in 2018. Why not, Witness?
- 3 * A. [12:45:29] Because I wasn't asked for this document. I provided it after being
- 4 questioned. I told them that after my release, I was given such documents. They asked
- 5 me if I could bring the documents. I answered yes and I gave them the documents
- 6 thereafter.
- 7 Q. [12:46:07] We can remove the document, Court Officer. Thank you.
- 8 Thank you, Witness. Once again, it's just to be sure that everything is clear. You
- 9 state, "They asked me the question could I bring documentation, I answered yes, and I
- 10 provided this documentation afterwards." So just to be sure that I've understood,
- 11 this would mean that after your statement was taken, you saw the -- you saw the
- 12 investigators again and provided them with the documentation; is that correct,
- Witness?
- 14 A. [12:47:01] That's correct.
- 15 Q. [12:47:14] Do you remember how much time had passed since your statement or
- 16 how long after it was? * Your statement was in September and October 2018, so how
- long afterwards was it that you provided the investigators of the Office of the
- 18 Prosecutor with these documents?
- 19 A. [12:47:37] I don't know. I've forgotten.
- 20 Q. [12:48:03] Very well, Witness.
- 21 Now, I will put a few questions on your provisional detention and I'll read a part
- from your statement at tab 1.
- 23 This is tab 5 for the French version and 6 for the English version, CAR-OTP -- so this
- 24 is CAR-OTP-2127-9708, page 9719.
- 25 Thank you, Court Officer.

- 1 So if we can go down to paragraph 39.
- 2 Thank you very much.
- 3 So I'll read the paragraph, Witness. So it's written:
- 4 "It became apparent later that we were the first prisoners to have been kept there
- 5 since the arrival of the Seleka in Bangui. I know this because there was nobody else
- 6 there and because our discussions with the guards confirmed this."
- 7 So if we go up a bit to show some of the context, we can see a bit further you are
- 8 speaking about Ngaragba prison.
- 9 No, that was fine.
- 10 Would you confirm that, Witness?
- 11 A. [12:50:42] Yes, I agree.
- 12 Q. [12:50:53] Witness, do you understand the sense of provisional detention?
- 13 A. [12:51:25] Could you explain that to me, then I could understand it better.
- 14 Q. [12:51:40] Very well, Witness.
- 15 Court officer, if we could show tab 32 on our list of notification, and that is
- 16 CAR-OTP-2001-3189, and this document can be shown to the witness.
- 17 CAR-OTP-2001-3199 and page 3694 thereof.
- 18 So that, that page is 3694. I'm sorry if I did not give it previously. Thank you very
- 19 much.
- 20 And now if we could zoom in on the article on the left, 91. Thank you.
- 21 I'll help you Witness. You can see Article 91 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in
- 22 the Central African Republic and it is written that -- Article 91 states that:
- 23 "In correctional matters, if the sentence undergone is equal to or superior to a year in
- 24 prison and if the obligations of judicial control are insufficient with regard to the
- conditions defined in article 97 of the present code, provisional detention may be

- 1 ordered or maintained:
- 2 When provisional detention of the accused is the only means to conserve evidence or
- 3 materials, or to prevent either pressure on witnesses or victims, or a fraudulent
- 4 agreement between accused and accomplices;
- 5 When this detention is necessary to preserve public order from trouble that would
- 6 be caused by the crime or offence, in order to protect the accused, and to put an end
- 7 to the crime or offence or to prevent it from occurring once again or to guarantee the
- 8 maintenance of the accused at the disposal of justice."
- 9 Do you understand better the meaning of provisional detention -- provisional
- detention now I have read the Code of Criminal Procedure?
- 11 A. [12:55:20] Yes, I have understood it.
- 12 Q. [12:55:39] Very well, Witness.
- 13 During your provisional detention, were you presented to an investigating
- 14 magistrate?
- 15 A. [12:56:04] Our statements were taken and we were told if -- we weren't told
- whether it was an investigating magistrate or whatever, but when we were arrested,
- before being taken to the tribunal from the OCRB, when we arrived there, we were
- 18 heard, we were questioned and then we were taken there to Ngaragba.
- 19 Q. [12:57:11] Court officer, could you show tab 17 on our notification list, and this
- is CAR-OTP-2135-3192, page 3201. And the item can be shown to the witness.
- 21 Do you see the document\t, Witness?
- 22 A. [12:58:08] Yes, I can see it on the screen.
- Q. [12:58:13] So if we can zoom in on the first half of the page, if you would be so
- 24 kind.
- 25 Very well. So if we go a bit further up in order to start.

- 1 * So at the top of the page can you see a summons to bring, "MANDAT D'AMENER",
- 2 or arrest warrant?
- 3 A. [12:58:55] Yes, I can see it.
- 4 Q. [12:58:56] And this document concerns, as you can see on the screen, (Redacted),
- 5 who was one of your co-accused. Would you confirm that?
- 6 A. [12:59:13] Yes, I see the name, (Redacted).
- 7 * Q. [12:59:20] And you can see here that this is a warrant of arrest for (Redacted)
- 8 from the 3rd *juge d'instruction*, that is the investigating magistrate Do you see that,
- 9 Witness? To bring (Redacted) before the 3rd judge of the tribunal of grand instance
- 10 in Bangui. Do you see that, Witness?
- 11 A. [12:59:45] Yes, I see that.
- 12 Q. [12:59:47] Does this document refresh your memory, Witness? Were you
- 13 brought before an investigating magistrate as (Redacted) was?
- 14 A. [13:00:03] (Redacted) left differently, on a different day. I went on another day.
- 15 Q. [13:00:27] Very well, Witness. So when you say, "I went on another day", so
- 16 you did go to see an investigating magistrate but it was on a different day to the day
- on which (Redacted) went; is that right, Witness?
- 18 A. [13:00:47] Yes, because we were questioned separately.
- 19 Q. [13:00:53] Thank you, Mr Witness.
- 20 MR JACOBS: [13:01:02](Interpretation) Madam President, I can see the time.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [13:01:06] Yes. Thank you very much, Mr Jacobs.
- 22 Although you will have to -- I know we meet again with this witness on Wednesday.
- 23 How much more time would you want with this witness?
- 24 Sorry, Mr Jacobs. Let me just listen to the Prosecutor.
- 25 MS MAKWAIA: [13:01:31] I think you said Wednesday, Madam President. Isn't it

- 1 Tuesday? No? Okay. I stand corrected.
- 2 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [13:01:40] It's Wednesday.
- 3 Yes, Mr Jacobs.
- 4 MR JACOBS: [13:01:44](Interpretation) Thank you, Madam President. It's always
- 5 difficult to assess, but I think in view of how far we've come, it will be difficult to do it
- 6 in less than one session. I think I'll need the first full session and then part of the
- 7 second session.
- 8 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [13:02:04] That's okay. That's noted.
- 9 Mr Witness, we're going to stop your testimony here for today, but we'll continue
- 10 with your cross-examination by Mr Jacobs on Wednesday, that is the day after
- 11 tomorrow. So I'm going to remind you -- first of all, let me ask that we go into -- are
- we in open session? Yes, can we go into open session, please.
- 13 (Open session at 1.02 p.m.)
- 14 THE COURT OFFICER: [13:02:47] We're back in open session, Madam President.
- 15 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [13:02:50] Okay, thank you very much.
- 16 So, Mr Witness, as I was saying, we'll end your testimony for today here at this point,
- but we'll meet again on Wednesday, that is the day after tomorrow, so that counsel
- 18 for Mr Said can continue his cross-examination with you. I'm going to remind you
- 19 that you will still be on oath so whatever we've done here today, whatever you've
- 20 said here today, questions put to you here today by counsel for the Prosecution and
- 21 the Legal Representative for the victims and Mr Jacobs for the Defence must not be
- 22 discussed with any other person until we meet here again on Wednesday and we will
- 23 continue our discussion.
- 24 Counsel, I'm going to ask that -- I'm going to rise the Court and ask that we come
